


<p>HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE):</p> <p>The 1932 city directory indicates that this was the home of: Mrs. Edna Terry, an employee of Mountain State Telephone and Telegraph, and her son Wayne; and Orion French, an employee of the Littleton Woolen Mills, and his wife, Edna. In 1939, this was the home of J.P.C. and Marie Dickinson and Harry and Nora Anderson. Harry Anderson was a mechanic with Bussard Motor Company. Mr. Dickinson worked as a foreman at Denver Mutal Water Works.</p>
