ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Fraternal lodge with flat roof one-story wings flanking stepped back central flat roof two-story section with entrance; stone coping. Walls composed of buff-colored raked brick; concrete foundation. Central glazed entrance area with large panels of plate glass surrounding double doors with three large lights facing low concrete stoop covered with carpet. Sheltering entrance is projecting flat hood with metal trim and with post supports atop brick planters with stone trim. Above hood in center of upper story is band of casement windows with transoms with shared stone surround. East wall of each one-story wing mimics the central window, although with shorter windows without transoms. Ribbons of glass block windows on south, upper story.
