


ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: 2 1/2-story town hall building with main (n.) facade clad with architectural terra cotta; side and rear wall composed of brick; concrete foundation. Flat roof with projecting piers enframing hip roof, tiled, projecting cornice with modillions. Terra cotta tiles cast to resemble smooth stone blocks; at foundation is different type of terra cotta with slightly rougher face and grained appearance. First story features arcade of triple pointed arches accentuated by molding and ornament; each arch contains inset entrance with mutli-light doors, overdoors, and sidelights. Flanking central arch are wrought iron lanterns. Central arcade of five slender pointed arch windows with polychromatic ornaments are accentuated by small columns and flanked by single windows with wrought iron balconets. Corner quoins. CONSTRUCTION HISTORY (DESCRIPTION, NAMES, DATES, ETC., RELATING TO MAJOR ALTERATIONS TO ORIGINAL STRUCTURE): A large concrete block addition was added to the building after it ceased functioning as the Town Hall to accommodate its new role as a performing arts center.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE): In 1919 Littleton voters approved a bond issue for a new city hall. Construction began on the site of the old town hall. This building was erected at a cost of \$24,725 as the Littleton Town Hall in 1920. It was designed by prominent architect Jules Jacques Benoit Benedict, a Littleton resident, who also designed the town's Carnegie Library at the west end of Main Street. Town officials requested that the front of the building would "have a character that would dominate the design." Bendict reportedly drew his inspiration for the building from the Palazzo della Regione in Vincenza, Italy. The Denver Terra Cotta produced and installed the facade's terra cotta cladding. Benedict made the lanterns from old iron balconies and donated them to the city. The building drew national notice in architectural and municipal journals and was proclaimed the "finest town hall for a small American town." The building housed town offices and the fire department; a small jail building stood in the southwest corner of the parcel at the alley. In 1911, the first motion picture show in Littleton was presented in the Town Hall. As Littleton grew over the years, the Town Hall became inadequate to house city staff and programs. In 1976-77 a new city building (Littleton Center) was constructed at 2255 W. Berry Ave. This building then was remodeled to house the Littleton Town Hall Arts Center, a performing arts facility. Michael Barber of Muchow Associates was in charge of the restoration and remodeling, which created a proscenium theater and basement cabaret.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: The Littleton Town Hall is significant for its historical associations for housing Littleton town offices from 1920 through 1977. Architecturally, the building is significant as an example of the Italian Renaissance style, reflected in the symmetrical facade with hipped roof, tiled, bracketed cornice projection; the first story arcade; the smaller windows of the upper story accentuated with columns and balconets; the corner quoins; and masonry walls. The building displays high artistic values in its terra cotta front, arches, polychromatic ornament, and wrought iron. The Town Hall also significant as an example of the work of J.J.B. Benedict, who also designed the Littleton Carnegie Library, numerous private homes, churches (including Holy Ghost Church, the Chapel at St. Thomas Seminary, and St. Malo Chapel), the Central Savings Bank, and Rosedale and Park Hill elementary schools. The Littleton Town Hall received national attention in publications such as "Architectural Record" and "American Builder."
