

Audi Denver Littleton Twilight Criterium Returns August 3

Come to Historic Downtown Littleton Saturday, August 3 for a day full of free family fun and watch some of the best cyclists in the country compete at the Audi Denver Littleton Twilight Criterium.

The day includes 11 races ranging from a junior's division in the afternoon to the men's and women's pro divisions under the lights in the evening. In total, more than 500 racers will compete on the NASCAR-style circuit through the streets of Downtown Littleton, making it the largest road cycling race in Colorado.

There will be live music by Journey tribute band *Those Crazy Nights*, food trucks, a beer garden, a "cruiser" ride through the course open to everyone, and a dedicated family area. The races run from 2:15 to 10 p.m., and the entire event is free to attend.

Safer Streets: Pilot Projects Move Forward

Littleton's Public Works planners, engineers, and staff are installing numerous pilot projects geared toward bike and pedestrian safety citywide this summer, allowing them to test methods and materials for wider implementation going forward as part of the Safer Streets Littleton initiative. The public can now provide feedback on pilot projects via a survey available at LittletonCO.gov/SaferStreets.


Pilot projects include:

- Four trail-crossing improvements identified by the 2023 Littleton Linkages trail study, on the borders of Cornerstone, Ketring, Powers, and Sterne Parks. Crossings feature new crosswalks and "bulb-out" areas, which extend the curb at an intersection to shorten the crossing distance and improve visibility for pedestrians.
- Four lane-miles of protected bike lanes along Belleview

Avenue, Windermere Street, Pennsylvania Street, and Phillips Avenue. These are the first protected bike lanes in Littleton, adding physical barriers between riders and traffic – a step up from "buffered" bike lanes which demarcate a wide area between traffic lanes and bike lanes. These projects allow planners and engineers to test different types of barriers and how they impact not just rider safety but maintenance needs like street sweeping, snowplowing, and drainage.

Reevaluation of pilot projects installed in 2023, including trail crossings, bikeway, and intersection enhancements. Existing projects will see further improvements based on data collection over the previous year, including stronger traffic calming measures in areas where

Littleton Museum Continues Post-Pandemic Rebound

The Littleton Museum has seen a strong rebound in visitation following a plunge during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The museum, which features indoor galleries and two living history farms, welcomed more than 2.1 million visitors between 2005 and 2019. The 15-year average of more than 141,000 annual visitors made it the best attended mid-size museum in Colorado.

Pandemic restrictions beginning in March 2020 saw the museum's 2020 visitation plunge to less than 26,000, climbing to just over 78,000 in 2021 – averaging a 64% decline over the 2005-2019 average.

Many American museums suffered during the pandemic, with almost a third facing closure in the immediate aftermath. Many continue to operate at a third of their pre-pandemic visitation levels.

The Littleton Museum, however, saw attendance rebound to 87% of pre-pandemic levels in 2023, clocking in at in-person attendance of nearly 124,000.

Bolstered by strong community support, the museum is also a major draw to economically-stressed patrons thanks to its free admission.

Pandemic-era restrictions also inspired innovation at the museum, leading to the creation of virtual programming that today accounts for more than 76,000 "virtual visitors."



While the museum's post-pandemic growth continues, the past four years have been a testament to the resilience of museum staff, the dedication of the City of Littleton, the devotion of the community, and an emblem of what makes Littleton a special place.

Communications Director Kelli Narde Announces Retirement



Littleton Communications Director Kelli Narde will retire September 13 after 33 years of service to the city.

Narde joined the City of Littleton in 1991 and left her mark on the city in many ways. Initially hired as Assistant to the City Manager, Narde collaborated on many significant projects. She says she is most proud of the public education work she led on the 3A, 3K, Lodgers Tax, and other ballot questions that left the city in a strong position for the future.

She spearheaded the creation of Littleton Channel 8

which began televising city council and other board meetings in the early 1990s. She edited and wrote hundreds of stories for the Littleton Report and ensured the on-time production of 198 issues.

Narde helped lead transformative projects for Littleton. She was on the team who renovated the Littleton Municipal Courthouse, which sat vacant for more than a decade and was nearly demolished.

Narde helped city council lobby for construction of the RTD Southwest Light Rail into Littleton and managed the installation of public art at Littleton's two stations, including a notable mural of early Littleton by Michelle Lamb at the Downtown station.

Narde was named Littleton's Communications Director in 2005, the same year she served on the project team for the expansion of the Littleton Museum's main building.

As Communications Director, Narde grew the communications department to a staff of 7.5, a team that now produces social media, print and online newsletters, video production, and graphic design, right down to the banners over Main Street. She has been the city's Public Information Officer responding to media inquiries about the city.

Littleton's events calendar grew substantially under Narde's leadership, from little more than a pint-sized version of the Candlelight Walk in the 1990s, to a slate that now includes Meet Greet & Eats, Little Jam free concerts, the Twilight Criterium, and more.

Narde helped guide the community through tough times as well, including the 1999 Columbine High School shooting in nearby Jefferson County and the accompanying influx of international media. Narde also coordinated the city's outreach through the COVID-19 pandemic and supported Bemis Public Library and the Littleton Museum to increase their slate of virtual offerings. The digital newsletter, the Littleton Report Online, was created during this time to fulfill the need for increased communication with residents.

Recently, Narde oversaw the rollout of Visit Littleton, a tourism campaign focused on Littleton's arts and culture scene and outdoor adventures with the goal of supporting local businesses and increasing awareness of the great things the city has to offer.

In retirement, Narde looks forward to golf, travel, and spending time with her family, especially her young grandson.

"It's truly been an honor to work for the citizens of Littleton," Narde said. "People here are involved and they're also very caring. I'm grateful to have worked with the most talented people I could dream of. It's been a great ride.

City Lays Out Initiatives in Horizon 2027

The City of Littleton has a new strategic plan, Horizon 2027, that will guide priorities and development through the next two to three years. City council approved the plan at its June 4 meeting.

It defines initiatives to be pursued in the coming years that align with the city's five outcomes established in the Envision Littleton long-term comprehensive plan that was developed in 2019.

Those five outcomes are to ensure that, over the next 20 years, Littleton is known as a city that is:

- A vibrant community with a rich culture
- A sustainable community with natural beauty
- A robust and resilient economy
- A safe community

Geneva Lodge to Get Facelift with **Help from State Grant**

Geneva Lodge will get a facelift this year after city council approved a contract to rehabilitate the exterior of the nearly century-old landmark.

The historic former farmhouse looks over Geneva Lake just steps from the Littleton Center. Built in 1926, the house was the home of the Geneva Association, a convalescent home for retired hospitality workers. The City of Littleton purchased the property in 1975, and it was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1999. It now houses Littleton's

Public Works Engineering division.

Public Works staff secured a \$250,000 State Historic Fund grant to rehabilitate the exterior, including replacing wood siding and trim, masonry, wood doors, 105 historic and non-historic wood windows, and site drainage improvements. The remainder of the roughly \$700,000 project will be paid for by the voter-approved Big Things sales tax measure.

Work is expected to begin in late summer, with completion expected in summer 2025.



Littleton Advances Housing Goals

Littleton continues to advance its goals to meet housing needs by leveraging funding, regulations, and partnerships, leading to notable achievements in the first half of 2024.

Overlook at Powers Park, an affordable senior housing complex, opened in January. Built by South Metro Housing Options (SMHO), Littleton's housing authority, Overlook adds 51 affordable units to the city.

The City of Littleton committed \$1 million in federal ARPA funds and fee-in-lieu dollars collected through the inclusionary housing ordinance to support SMHO's proposed affordable housing development Montview Flats, proposed for a site on South Rapp Street north of Arapahoe Community College. Montview Flats will provide roughly 50 affordable units to those earning 30 to 70% of area median income.

Littleton opted into funding via Proposition 123, a newly-created, voter-approved affordable housing fund, which may be accessible by residents of Littleton's manufactured home parks, and can provide opportunities for down payment assistance and home rehabilitation.

Littleton's inclusionary housing ordinance, which requires multifamily housing developers to add affordable units or pay a fee-in-lieu, is working as designed, with several projects in the development pipeline that will include affordable units.

Work on the Neighborhood Housing Opportunities Unified Land Use Code update has launched, focused on reducing existing code barriers to allow more diversity in housing types, particularly for middle income housing. Achieving more variety in housing is a goal of Envision Littleton 2040 and helps the city move toward its vision of residents being able to find suitable and economic housing options at all stages of life.



Arapahoe County Shareback Funds Support Park Renovations

Numerous park improvements are coming to Littleton, supported in part by more than \$1.6 million in open space Share-back funds from Arapahoe County.

Each year, the county gives its municipalities 50% of the revenues generated by the Arapahoe County Open Space Sales and Use Tax. The county collected about \$43 million from May 2023 to May 2024, and the funds are distributed to cities based on population. It's the largest Shareback program in Colorado.

The funds each municipality receives must be used for projects that are open to the community such as park de-



velopment, walking and biking trails, and open space maintenance.

This year, the biggest Littleton project using Shareback funds is the redevelopment of Reynolds Landing. Construction is set to begin in late summer, and once completed, the park will be transformed to include shallow wading pools along the riverbank, numerous nature play opportunities, and a terrace overlooking the river.

Another project using the Shareback money is the Ketring-Gallup Park Master Plan, which is looking at better connecting Ketring Park, Gallup Gardens, and Gallup Park.

Other projects supported by these funds include improvements to Jackass Hill Park in partnership with South Suburban Parks and Recreation and beginning design work at Ridgeview Park. In the past, the city used these funds for improvements at the Carson Nature Center, new trail wayfinding signs throughout the city, and to cover operational costs at South Platte Park.

City Council Approves Marijuana Regulation Changes

The Littleton City Council unanimously approved changes to rules regarding retail and medical marijuana regulations June 4.

Retail marijuana sales were approved by Littleton voters in 2020. Littleton currently has three retail marijuana dispensaries.

Council made three changes to the city's marijuana licensing provisions:

- Increased hours of operation from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., to 8 a.m. to midnight.
- Allowed medical patients to purchase more than two ounces at a time as prescribed by a registered doctor in accordance with state statute.
- Increased the square-footage limit from a maximum of 2,000 square feet to 4,000 square feet.

Proponents say the changes bring Littleton's licensing requirements more in line with surrounding communities.

Littleton Increases Electric Vehicle Fleet

The City of Littleton added two more electric vehicles to its fleet this summer, making progress toward a state mandate to increase electrification of government light-duty vehicle fleets to help cut carbon emissions.

The two new Chevrolet EV Blazers join two Silverados and two Bolt vehicles purchased in recent months and used by city engineers and inspectors. The electric vehicles save the city money on fuel and maintenance, said Cal Weatherly, Littleton's fleet manager.

"No oil changes, no transmission fluid, we're saving thousands each year in gas, and we're keeping 100 tons of carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere per vehicle per year," Weatherly said. "It's a win-win."

Public Works already electrified most of its small maintenance equipment like chainsaws and leaf blowers, Weatherly said.

Littleton Report Online Wins National Award

Littleton's Communications Department was honored with a 2024 Blue Pencil Award from the National Association of Government Communicators (NAGC) for the Littleton Report Online.

The NAGC's Blue Pencil and Gold Screen awards are given out every year to government organizations across the country recognizing excellence in the field of communications. This year, NAGC peer judges reviewed more than 360 entries from all levels of government. A total of 100 winners were recognized across 33 categories.



Littleton Report Online began as a weekly communications tool during the pandemic in order to communicate more frequently with residents. It transitioned to a bi-weekly publication to keep residents informed of city programs, events, services, and job opportunities. There are more than 3,300 subscribers. Building Permit System Streamlined

The City of Littleton's Building Division is making changes to simplify its online eTRAKIT building permitting system.

Residents and builders have a new set of permit types to select from, although the required documents and permit approval process remain the same. The goal of these changes is to make it easier for contractors and homeowners to find the correct permit for the work they are doing.

The Building Division will issue new permit cards with each approved permit. The card must be displayed in an accessible location at the project site.

In addition, there are several changes as to whether a project requires a building permit and inspection. Sewer/Stormwater Bills Due by August 15

The City of Littleton's annual 2024 Sewer and Storm Drainage Utility bills were mailed in late February.

Payment is due by August 15. Late payments will incur a 15% penalty added to the remaining balance and a past-due notice will be mailed in late September.

Cash, check, credit card, and Bill Pay are accepted.

Senior Property Tax Refund

Since 1977, the Littleton City Council has annually renewed its Senior Refund Program, providing the city's senior residents with a partial property tax refund.

The program is available to both renters and property owners. For property owners, the refund is based on the property's assessed valuation. Refund amounts range from \$10 to \$100. Refunds for renters range from \$10 to \$30.

Property owners whose property is in a trust or other legal entity for estate planning purposes may be eligible for a property tax refund based on the property's assessed valuation.

To be eligible for a refund, applicants must be 65 years or older on or before December 31 of the previous year and resided in the Littleton city limits for the entire



Don't Move Firewood

Moving firewood long distances can potentially transport invasive species, like emerald ash borer. Instead of moving firewood, buy certified heat-treated wood, or as permitted, gather wood on-site.

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) was confirmed in Littleton in June of 2023. This devastating pest kills any untreated ash trees. Researchers believe the pest entered Littleton through the inadvertent moving of firewood from a contaminated region. It is important to burn wood locally!




